Recycling FUN FACT

Did You Know? Every three months, Americans throw enough aluminum in landfills to build our nation's entire commercial air fleet.

>>> Nature Newsflash

Help reduce water pollution – adopt a drain When leaves, twigs, and grass clippings run down our storm drains, they can harm our lakes and rivers. Nutrients (like phosphorus) from yard waste and other debris feed the algae that turn lakes green. And some of that street waste contains harmful bacteria as well as chemicals that can kill aquatic life.

You can be part of the solution by regularly clearing your local drain. Twice a month you grab a broom and a bucket and clean the area on top and around the drain grate (don't remove the grate). Then dispose of the waste in appropriate trash and recycling receptacles. Ideally, you would then document your work online so that the good folks at Minnesota Adopt-A-Drain can track our community's collective efforts. The Adopt-a-Drain - Minnesota website has lots of helpful resources, including a map where you can see which drains are available for adoption. You pick your very own, name it (be creative-there are some clever names on the map), and sign up to clean it. The site also has great resources for educators to use in teaching the next generation of water stewards.

>>> CODE ENFORCEMENT CORNER

This week's edition of Code Enforcement Corner has been invaded by invasive plants!

Have you spent hours and hours perfecting your lawn only to spot lovely purple, bell-shaped flowers with heart-shaped leaves popping up and eventually choking out your spotless yard? You may have an invasive species problem. Creeping Bellflower is a very pretty, very hardy, and very tough perennial... and it is super invasive. A single plant can produce 3,000 to 15,000 seeds that have little wings to help them spread throughout the environment. When eradicating, if you leave behind even a tiny root fragment, a new plant will pop up. It's like the Greek Hydra of plants. It's even been known as the "Zombie Weed."

How do you get rid of it? There are a few options. You can go the route of removal by hand, but be sure to get all parts of the plants, and note that extensive digging may be required. You can also attempt to smother it with newspaper, cardboard, and mulch. Just note that herbicides tend to be ineffective, but there are a few you can try (see link below). But be warned, it may take months or even years to fully get this out of your yard.

Multifamily EV Carshare Pilot Project

HOURCAR is opening applications for the third and final round of the Multifamily EV Carshare Pilot Program. Leveraging funding from the U.S. Department of Energy and partnerships with Xcel Energy, the American Lung Association, and East Metro Strong, the project aims to increase electric mobility options for low-income residents while also decreasing the cost of and other barriers to building out electric vehicle charging stations at multifamily dwellings.

Through this project, up to 10 multifamily sites within HOURCAR's service area will be provided with the heavily to completely subsidized installation of two level 2 charging ports by Xcel and two electric carsharing vehicles by HOURCAR. Selected property owners will host the electric carshare vehicles on their property for an 18-month pilot period in partnership with HOURCAR with the option to extend and contract with Xcel Energy as part of their Multi-Dwelling Unit Project (MDU) EV Pilot Project, which requires sites to keep the charger onsite for a 10-year amortization period after installation.

While any multifamily site of 5 or more units can apply, priority will be given to sites that are within their identified priority area and meet the affordability criteria of 66% of units being affordable to households at 60% of the area median income or lower.


