Ebbesen will send Staff feedback collected from residents at Spring Together to compile and present at Ice Cream Social.

Cooley-Kistler wonders if we would like to do the dog show again.

Wehyee suggests drawing more attention to the dog show as it's taking place because a lot of people didn't hear an announcement and missed it last year.

Bradbury mentions some neighbor kids want to do an animal fundraiser and wonders if a dog show / pet parade at a future fall event would pair well with that.

Ebbesen will email the local dance studio to confirm their dance performance.

Bradbury and Ebbesen suggest putting itineraries / maps out within the park and Ebbesen suggests printing 11 x 17 posters to hang up.

Ebbesen suggests placing signage in the park in early July to let residents know the date earlier than it was done last year.

Tracy mentions that Roseville has been hosting events in their parks weekly and he will reach out to the former Parks Director to inquire if they loan out their Puppet Wagon.

Bradbury suggests reaching out to schools to ask if we can borrow games from their PTA.

Mielke suggests making an announcement regarding the purchase of Community Park. Also suggests Park and Rec commissioners have a table to gather input for new park building and amenities.

Nelson shares a sample of the revised event flyer and no changes were proposed. Ice cream social will be promoted for a total of 13 weeks.

### 2. Fall Planning

Nelson updates commissioners on summer programming, sharing how staffing has been a challenge and residents only had interest in the soccer program. Staffing fall programming will likely also be a challenge. So, how would commissioners like to proceed?

Tracy says it's clear what's NOT working, so we might as well try something new.

Lundell says it's nice to see the field being used.

Yager wonders how many kids were interested in fall programming last year before the City canceled it.

Commissioners advise Nelson to reach out to the Blackhawks / Skyhawks / City of Roseville to see if any of them are interested in conducting programming within our parks for our residents.

### 3. Draft #2 of PARC Agenda / Calendar

Commissioners review the revised agenda calendar (they had suggested a few changes at the last meeting) and determine this version is a good working version to use moving forward.

Yager asks that ice rink and warming house discussion be added to the October meeting agenda.

Commissioners discuss some ideas for a fall event at Grove (dog parade, pumpkin carving / judging, food trucks, activity with ties to The Good Acre).

#### 4. Fitness Court

Nelson explains they had a call to hear about Fitness Courts that National Fitness Campaign (NFC), a wellness consulting firm, is bringing to communities through a competitive grant from BlueCross BlueShield Minnesota. Nelson wants feedback to determine if the commission finds this of interest to work towards offering to parkgoers.

Tracy says that Roseville has added fitness stations east of Lake Bennett. He says that if we did something similar, adding to what we already have at Community Park, we'd essentially have the same Fitness Court. But, he prefers activities being spaced out and not all in one area because it keeps people moving throughout the park to the next circuit. And, it maintains more green space.

Lundell agrees and feels keeping the green space is more appealing than the Fitness Court.

Brenton says he liked the Fitness Court presentation at first glance. But, he agrees that keeping green space and improving existing fitness stations is more preferred.

### F. INFORMATION/ANNOUNCEMENT

### 1. Recap Spring Together

Nelson shares that we served 273 pieces of ice cream at an expense of \$1,226. While we did accidentally hand some of the same individuals two tickets instead of one, attendance was likely a solid 200 throughout the event. The event was promoted for ten weeks in our newsletter and the City promoted it on Facebook and NextDoor. Nelson asks for feedback on improving the event next year.

Tracy suggests purchasing event signage to place near Curtiss Field a couple of weeks before the event.

Cooley-Kistler wonders how many renters were reached by placing an event flyer at apartments; was it successful?

Mielke knows we reached some Amber Union residents because she spoke with them at the event.

Bradbury suggests asking schools to include our events in their newsletters.

van der Werff says that we could also send our event to Roseville and ask if they'd share it, as the City is sometimes asked to share theirs.

Mielke suggests having the event from 3:00 to 5:00 next year (moving the event up one hour).

Bradbury suggests adding food trucks. This would be especially nice if the event time does not change, to help offer food during the 4:00 to 6:00 timeframe.

Nelson shares information received from Sport Court regarding painting courts at Curtiss and Grove parks. The finish on the Curtiss Field basketball court would be slippery if the court was fully painted. So, instead of having Bradbury produce three examples of courts

for an upcoming meeting, with three levels of paint used from low to high, only minimal paint may now be used. The commissioners opt to paint basic (high school regulation) game lines on the lower end of the court with a standard hoop. At the other end of the court, with the mini hoop, lines for playing Around the World will be painted. Game lines for pickleball will be painted on Grove court. Estimated painting cost is \$900 per court Proposed paint colors: white lines on Grove asphalt court, green on Curtiss cement court. Painting may be done in September, depending on the wait list.

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

Item	2023 Summer Recreation Summary and Fall Programming Update
Description	2023 Summer Recreation has ended and Staff would like to recap this season and reflect on what can be improved or changed for next year.
	Enrollment numbers have continued to decrease. Although the City initially offered tennis, soccer and Summer Discovery Playground classes this summer, the City only had adequate registration numbers for soccer in order to move forward. We also did not have adequate enrollment numbers to move forward with any programming at Commonwealth Terrace Cooperative (CTC) on the U of M campus.
	Enrollment clearly impacts revenue. However, it should be noted that hiring seasonal employees for the 2022 summer season was very difficult. This year, we had just enough staff to handle the amount of programming we were offering, but we would not have been able to accommodate higher enrollment numbers, more classes, or a second location at CTC.
	At the conclusion of summer programming, Staff surveyed parents of kids who participated in soccer. A copy of the survey and responses (as of 7/31/23) are attached for commission review.
	Fall Programming: During the June 5, 2023 Parks and Recreation Commission meeting, Commissioners advaided Staff to look into different fall programming options. One option was to reach out to the St. Paul Blackhawks to ask if they would offer soccer programming to Falcon Heights youth in some capacity, whether as a series of classes or as a one-day soccer clinic at Community Park. Staff is waiting for information to be sent over by the Blackhawks for further consideration.
	Staff also reached out to Roseville's Parks and Recreation Director to see if they would be able and willing to provide reciprocity to Falcon Heights residents registering for Roseville programming. And, if they needed additional facilities, then the City would be open to discussing use of ours as part of the agreement. Roseville said that they might also face similar challenges to ours (staff already overextended or having just enough staff for current enrollment numbers) but they said they'd be willing to discuss further with the City at a TBD time and date.




## Q2 The instructor(s) were well prepared.







## Q3 I was able to discuss any concerns with instructor(s).






## Q5 The participant enjoyed the program.


## Q6 The cost of the program was...



# Q7 I would be willing to pay more in order to enhance the quality of the program.





## Q8 The program met my expectations.





## Q10 Would you register the participant for this program again?






# Q12 Next year, would you enroll in a similar Falcon Heights program or look to a larger, surrounding city such as Roseville or St. Paul instead?

#### **ARTICLE II - PUBLIC CONDUCT IN PARKS**

Sec. 34-19 - Purpose

It is the purpose of this article to protect and promote the public health, safety, and general welfare of the people of the city by regulating the use of and management of public parks and facilities within the city. This section is in addition to all other sections, statutes and regulations that might be applicable to the city.

(Code 1993, § 3-4.01(A))

#### Sec. 34-20 - Hours and access; permits

- (a) *Hours*. The parks shall be open to the public between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. No person shall remain, stop, use or be present in any park between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. Exceptions may be made when special use permits have been authorized and issued.
- (b) *Permits*. The city shall require permits for the exclusive use of all or portions of specific areas, buildings, and other facilities and for conducting events of a cultural, educational, political, religious or recreational nature; and for specific exemption from any provision of

this article. Any person, group or association of persons required to obtain a permit shall file an application for such permit with the clerk.

- (1) The holder of a permit shall be liable for any loss, damage, or injury sustained by the parks or by any person resulting from the negligence of the person or persons to whom such permits are issued.
- (2) The grantee of a permit shall not transfer or relinquish said permit to another person or group without the written permission of the clerk.
- (3) The council shall have the authority to revoke a permit upon evidence of good cause.
- (4) Council may, by resolution, adopt rules, policies, and procedures from time to time for issuance of exclusive use permits.

(Code 1993, § 3-4.01(B); Ord. No. 0-94-10, § 1, 9-28-1994)

#### Sec. 34-21 - Operation of bicycles; animals; camps; tennis court permits

- (a) No person shall ride or operate a bicycle in any park except for designated bikeways or surfaces normally provided for vehicular traffic.
- (b) People are prohibited from bringing animals in public parks, except:
  - (1) Dogs accompanying a person engaged in search or rescue activities;
  - (2) Service dogs as provided in Minnesota Statutes § 256C.02;
  - (3) Dogs on a leash six feet or less in length except leashed dogs are prohibited in playgrounds, tennis and basketball courts, park shelters, ice rinks and areas with a sign prohibiting dogs.
- (c) No person shall establish or maintain any camp or other temporary lodging or sleeping place in any park.
- (d) Any person with a tennis court permit has the right to use the court for the time specified on the permit.

#### Sec. 34-22 - Unlawful conduct

- (a) Defacement and destruction of property. No person shall tamper with, climb on, deface, destroy or remove any part of any park building, structure, sign, light pole, drinking fountain, plantings, table, grill, equipment, or other property.
- (b) *Fires*. No person shall start or maintain a fire in any park site, except small recreational fires in designated grills provided or intended for that purpose.
- (c) Alcoholic and intoxicating beverages. No person shall transport, possess, offer for sale, consume or be under the influence of any beer, wine, liquor or other alcoholic or intoxicating beverage in any park site. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Code, the only sanction to be taken against a person who violates this subsection by being

- intoxicated shall be ejection from the park; provided, that nothing in this subsection prohibits prosecution of such person for trespass should the person refuse to leave the park.
- (d) *Unlawful sales*. No person shall sell or offer for sale, any object, merchandise or service or conduct any commercial enterprise except concessions invited by the city in conjunction with city-sponsored events or activities.

#### ARTICLE III - TOBACCO-FREE PARKS

#### Sec. 34-55 - Purpose

The City of Falcon Heights believes that there is sufficient medical evidence showing that the use of tobacco and secondhand smoke is a danger to the health, safety and general welfare of the community. Numerous studies have found that tobacco smoke is a cause for diseases and second hand smoke is particularly hazardous for children and the elderly. Discarding of tobacco products on the ground can result in litter and pose a risk of harm by, among other things being ingested by young children. The purpose of this article is to set forth rules banning the use of tobacco products in city parks, thereby making such areas cleaner, safer and more enjoyable for residents and the general public.

(Ord. No. 12-06, § 1, 6-27-2012)

#### Sec. 34-56 - Definitions

For the purpose of this article, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning:

City parks means any open or enclosed land improvements or facility which is owned, leased and operated by the City of Falcon Heights and which is reserved, designated or used for a playground, picnic area, garden area, bike or walking path, trail, nature preserve, green space, tennis court, sports or athletic field, skating rink, warming house, or other recreational open space area, and includes city-owned parking areas serving city parks or city facility and sidewalks located directly adjacent to a city park or facility.

Tobacco means cigarettes and any product containing, made, or derived from tobacco that is intended for human consumption, whether chewed, smoked, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, or any component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product; cigars; cheroots; stogies; perique; granulated, plug cut, crimp cut, ready rubbed, and other smoking tobacco; snuff; snuff flour; cavendish; plug and twist tobacco; fine cut and other chewing tobaccos; shorts; refuse scraps, clippings, cuttings and sweepings of tobacco; and other kinds and forms of tobacco. Tobacco excludes any tobacco product that has been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product, as a

tobacco dependence product, or for other medical purposes, and is being marketed and sold solely for such an approved purpose.

*Use* means smoking, inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted cigar, cigarette, pipe, weed, or plant in any manner of in any form, chewing, sniffing, and spitting.

#### Sec. 34-57 - Prohibited activities

- (a) Tobacco use prohibited in certain areas. Tobacco use is prohibited in the following areas:
  - (1) City parks;
  - (2) Inside motor vehicles owned or operated by the city;
  - (3) Inside motor vehicles at city parks.
- (b) *Exceptions*. Notwithstanding any other provision to the contrary, the following areas are exempt from the provisions of this article:
  - (1) City streets, easements, and sidewalks unless located adjacent or within city parks.

#### Sec. 34-58 - Posting of signs

"Tobacco-Free Grounds" sign or signs with a similar designation will be clearly and conspicuously displayed at city parks to notify the public that smoking and other tobacco use is prohibited.

#### Sec. 34-59 - Enforcement

- (a) *Complaints*. Any citizen who desires to register a complaint under this article may initiate enforcement with the city administrator or his/her designee.
- (b) *Violation and penalty*. It shall be a petty misdemeanor for any person to use tobacco in an area where tobacco use is prohibited by the provisions of this article.
- (c) Other applicable laws. This article shall not be interpreted or construed to permit tobacco use where it is otherwise restricted by other applicable laws.

## **Current Encampment Response**

Public complaints about tents or encampments on park property are taken by MPRB Customer Service Department by phone (612-230-6400) or email (info@minneapolisparks.org). If there is no indication of crime or immediate safety concerns, the complaint is referred to the MPRB Community Connections and Violence Prevention Department for follow-up. If there are any indications of violence, crime, or information that a person is a threat to themselves or others, that complaint is referred to the MPRB Park Police Department or 911.

The MPRB Community Connections and Violence Prevention Department is responsible for:

- Responding to and evaluating reports of tents/encampments on park property
- Engaging encampment occupants about rules, regulations, and expectations
- Connecting encampment occupants to service providers
- Offering encampment occupants shelter alternatives
- · Coordinating encampment clean-up
- Issuing notices and communications to tents/encampments on behalf of the MPRB

The Park Police Department's role in encampment response is limited to the following:

- Preventing, responding to, and investigating crime
- Responding to and investigating suspicious behavior (reasonable, articulable suspicion)
- Responding to situations where a person may be a threat to themself or others (legal requirement for a transportation hold)
- Supporting the work of other internal and external staff, as requested (Community Connections and Violence Prevention Department, Asset Management Department, social service providers, etc.)

## Our Ongoing Response to Support Individuals Experiencing Homelessness

Like communities across our nation, Saint Paul is experiencing a housing crisis along the full housing continuum. This has created challenges for those in our community in need of stable, accessible, fair, and equitable housing, and for those experiencing unsheltered homelessness. Efforts such as the City of Saint Paul's <a href="Housing Trust">Housing Trust</a></a>
<a href="Fund">Fund</a>, developed by Mayor Melvin Carter to produce, preserve, and protect housing affordability for residents and our <a href="Families First Pilot Program">Families First Pilot Program</a> have helped respond to the many housing needs of our community.

Our Coordinated Response to Unsheltered Homelessness During COVID-19 Since 2018, the City has been actively responding to encampments through coordination and outreach in collaboration with Ramsey County, and nonprofit partners. Protocols are in place to monitor the safety and health of encampment residents, and ensure access to services. The City acts to restrict and close encampments when necessary to protect the health, safety or security of encampment residents. Before any action is taken on an encampment the City works with Ramsey County and nonprofit partners to find safe, stable housing for encampment residents. Our guiding principles:

- Everyone experiencing unsheltered homelessness is deserving of being treated with dignity and respect and in accordance with their rights.
- Every effort must be made to connect people to housing, shelter, and services.
- Encampments do not provide a safe, healthy or secure living environment.

The COVID-19 pandemic has had a significant impact on the numbers of people who are experiencing homelessness, and starting in 2020 the related economic impacts led to more residents sheltering in unsafe conditions in tents, under bridges, in caves. The pandemic also affected the way local jurisdictions respond to encampments. With the goal of limiting the spread of COVID-19, Governor Tim Walz's peacetime emergency and subsequent Executive Orders in 2020 outlined the conditions under which local jurisdictions could restrict, limit or close encampments. Those orders allowed encampments to be cleared if a local governmental entity either provided sufficient alternate housing, shelter or encampment space that complies with public health guidance, or if an encampment reached a size or status that posed a documented threat to the health, safety or security of residents.

Working in collaboration with Ramsey County and our outreach partners, we gather information and make decisions on a case-by-case basis to ensure our efforts align with our guiding principles. Our efforts remain focused on supporting the safety and health of unsheltered residents amid the pandemic and beyond. Our strategies include responding to the increased need for shelter, housing supports, and housing options, and expanding access to healthcare, mental/chemical health assessments, day space,

and shelter options for women, youth, LGBTQ, and other specific needs. The rising number of encampments during the pandemic has led at times to friction with nearby neighbors and businesses. One response has been City support of the "Block by Block" program, which employs Ambassadors to not only help maintain clean and welcoming streets in the downtown area but also to assist individuals experiencing homelessness access services. Ambassadors may also provide crime prevention information. When a law enforcement response is called for, Saint Paul Police call upon specialized units and increased patrols in targeted areas.

#### Site Closures

The City's experience in 2020 confirmed that homeless encampments do not provide a safe, healthy, or secure living environment. A City cross-departmental team regularly visited encampment sites to assess each location and plan how to address challenges brought on by harsh weather and other conditions. Those visits included wellness checks, engaging our Neighbors Helping Neighbors volunteers and ensuring every person experiencing homelessness was aware of the additional capacity for emergency shelter and how to access resources. The City went from a count of nearly 400 individuals in encampment sites in 2020 to less than 50.

In addition to its hotel program Ramsey County began post-COVID to add shelter program capacity, Luther Seminary, Mary Hall, Bethesda Hospital and the Provincial House at Carondelet (for families with minor children), which are now open. Freedom House in downtown Saint Paul, operated by Listening House, is also open for drop-in referral and other services during the day. In partnership with Ramsey County, we have created options to serve families and couples, including LGBTQ couples, provide storage of belongings, and meet transportation needs.

The City has thoughtfully closed approximately 60 unique encampments (many multiple times), aligning resources and services with occupants before and during closures. Many occupants are now in new low-barrier shelters, established through City-County partnerships, and have access to programming that leads to more permanent housing and supports. We will continue to close encampments based on safety risks as long as low-barrier shelter beds are available.

While these efforts help respond to the urgent needs brought on by this pandemic, we share an ongoing commitment to long-term permanent, affordable, and supportive housing to address housing instability in our community. Going forward our goals include: Connecting residents to longer-term supportive community resources; de-

escalating situations without risk of resident harm; and providing a supportive and appropriately trained response team of City staff.

#### Frequently Asked Questions

#### Q. What indoor options are provided for residents of the encampments?

In addition to the hotel program Ramsey County began in 2020 to add shelter program capacity, Luther Seminary, Mary Hall, the former Bethesda Hospital and the Provincial House at Carondelet are now open. These provide individual housing units with options to serve couples, including LGBTQ couples. Families are also provided individual housing units in additional locations.

City staff have been engaging residents staying at encampments throughout the City to ensure they know about and have access to the indoor options available. In advance of a closing, the city and county confirm availability of indoor housing units for all residents.

Freedom House in downtown Saint Paul, operated by Listening House, is open for dropin referral and other services during the day.

#### Q. What about safety and security in shelter?

All options in the Ramsey County shelter program have 24/7 on-site staff. The staff reflect the residents and have diverse experiences. They work to build relationships with residents and are CPR and Narcan trained. Wraparound services are provided in all programs: 3 meals per day; on-site mental health services; transportation services; health care and nursing. The goal is to provide pathways to housing stability with on-site benefit and housing navigation provided as well as support to remove barriers for housing readiness. Trauma-informed security, rooted in de-escalation, is provided 24/7 at all locations.

#### Q. What about concerns regarding COVID?

All shelter operations are following the CDC and MDH guidance to protect clients and staff from COVID.

#### Q. What is the long-term plan for residents experiencing homelessness?

While these efforts are a response to the urgent needs brought on by this pandemic, our ongoing commitment is to long-term permanent, affordable, and supportive housing to address the housing needs in our community.

#### How to help

We ask concerned residents who wish to help to let us know when they see a new encampment in their area. It is our intention to support individuals experiencing homelessness in taking the steps needed to transition to a more stable housing option.

Outreach partners <u>People Incorporated</u> and <u>RADIAS Health</u> accept financial contributions to support their work providing access to services. In addition to your preferred homeless service providers, other City nonprofit partners include Model Cities of Saint Paul; Catholic Charities of St. Paul and Minneapolis/Higher Ground Saint Paul Shelter; and Union Gospel Mission.

Project Home of Interfaith Action of Greater Saint Paul is located at the Provincial House, owned by Sisters of St Joseph of Carondelet. Project Home provides an important transitional space for homeless families, offering financial and job coaching as well as other services. #### **ARTICLE I - IN GENERAL**

#### **ARTICLE II - PUBLIC CONDUCT IN PARKS**

Sec. 34-19 - Purpose

It is the purpose of this article to protect and promote the public health, safety, and general welfare of the people of the city by regulating the use of and management of public parks and facilities within the city. This section is in addition to all other sections, statutes and regulations that might be applicable to the city.

#### Sec. 34-20 - Hours and access; permits

- (a) *Hours*. The parks shall be open to the public between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. No person shall remain, stop, use or be present in any park between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. Exceptions may be made when special use permits have been authorized and issued.
- (b) *Permits*. The city shall require permits for the exclusive use of all or portions of specific areas, buildings, and other facilities and for conducting events of a cultural, educational, political, religious or recreational nature; and for specific exemption from any provision of

this article. Any person, group or association of persons required to obtain a permit shall file an application for such permit with the clerk.

- (1) The holder of a permit shall be liable for any loss, damage, or injury sustained by the parks or by any person resulting from the negligence of the person or persons to whom such permits are issued.
- (2) The grantee of a permit shall not transfer or relinquish said permit to another person or group without the written permission of the clerk.
- (3) The council shall have the authority to revoke a permit upon evidence of good cause.
- (4) Council may, by resolution, adopt rules, policies, and procedures from time to time for issuance of exclusive use permits.

#### Sec. 34-21 - Operation of bicycles; animals; camps; tennis court permits

- (a) No person shall ride or operate a bicycle in any park except for designated bikeways or surfaces normally provided for vehicular traffic.
- (b) People are prohibited from bringing animals in public parks, except:
  - (1) Dogs accompanying a person engaged in search or rescue activities;
  - (2) Service dogs as provided in Minnesota Statutes § 256C.02;
  - (3) Dogs on a leash six feet or less in length except leashed dogs are prohibited in playgrounds, tennis and basketball courts, park shelters, ice rinks and areas with a sign prohibiting dogs.
- (c) No person shall establish or maintain any camp or other temporary lodging or sleeping place in any park.
- (d) Any person with a tennis court permit has the right to use the court for the time specified on the permit.

#### Sec. 34-22 - Unlawful conduct

- (a) Defacement and destruction of property. No person shall tamper with, climb on, deface, destroy or remove any part of any park building, structure, sign, light pole, drinking fountain, plantings, table, grill, equipment, or other property.
- (b) *Fires*. No person shall start or maintain a fire in any park site, except small recreational fires in designated grills provided or intended for that purpose.
- (c) Alcoholic and intoxicating beverages. No person shall transport, possess, offer for sale, consume or be under the influence of any beer, wine, liquor or other alcoholic or intoxicating beverage in any park site. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Code, the only sanction to be taken against a person who violates this subsection by being

- intoxicated shall be ejection from the park; provided, that nothing in this subsection prohibits prosecution of such person for trespass should the person refuse to leave the park.
- (d) *Unlawful sales*. No person shall sell or offer for sale, any object, merchandise or service or conduct any commercial enterprise except concessions invited by the city in conjunction with city-sponsored events or activities.

## ARTICLE III – USE OF TOBACCO, AND CANNABIS, AND HEMP-FREE IN CITY PARKS

Sec. 34-55 - Purpose

The City of Falcon Heights believes that there is sufficient medical evidence showing that the use smoking of tobacco, cannabis, hemp and secondhand smoke is a danger to the health, safety and general welfare of the community. Numerous studies have found that tobacco, cannabis, and hemp smoke is a cause for diseases and second-hand smoke is particularly hazardous for children and the elderly. Discarding of tobacco, cannabis, hemp, and cannabinoid products on the ground can result in litter and pose a risk of harm by, among other things being ingested by young children. The purpose of this article is to set forth rules banning concerning the use of tobacco, cannabis, hemp and cannabinoid products in city parks, thereby making such areas cleaner, safer and more enjoyable for residents and the general public.

#### Sec. 34-56 - Definitions

For the purpose of this article, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning:

City parks means any open or enclosed land improvements or facility which is owned, leased and operated by the City of Falcon Heights and which is reserved, designated or used for a playground, picnic area, garden area, bike or walking path, trail, nature preserve, green space, tennis court, sports or athletic field, skating rink, warming house, or other recreational open space area, and includes city-owned parking areas serving city parks or city facility and sidewalks located directly adjacent to a city park or facility.

Tobacco means cigarettes and any product containing, made, or derived from tobacco that is intended for human consumption, whether chewed, smoked, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, or any component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product; cigars; cheroots; stogies; perique; granulated, plug cut, crimp cut, ready rubbed, and other smoking tobacco; snuff; snuff flour; cavendish; plug and twist tobacco; fine cut and other chewing tobaccos; shorts; refuse scraps, clippings, cuttings and sweepings of tobacco; and other kinds and forms of tobacco. Tobacco excludes any tobacco product that has been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product, as a

tobacco dependence product, or for other medical purposes, and is being marketed and sold solely for such an approved purpose.

*Cannabis* means any product containing, made, or derived from cannabis that is intended for human consumption, including but not limited to flowers, seeds, resins, extracts, oils, tinctures, and edible forms whether consumed by smoking, vaporizing, eating, drinking, or any other means.

Cannabinoid products mean any products infused with any cannabinoids, including but not limited to tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and cannabidiol (CBD).

Electronic Delivery Device means any product containing or delivering nicotine, lobelia or any other substance, whether natural or synthetic, intended for human consumption through the inhalation of aerosol or vapor from the product. Electronic delivery device includes, but is not limited to, devices manufactured, marketed or sold as e-cigarettes, e-cigars, e-pipes, vape pens, mods, tank systems, or under and other product name or descriptor.

Hemp means any product contained the harvested flower, bud, leaves, or stems of a plant of the genus Cannabis that has a delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of no more than 0.3 percent on a dry weight basis. Hemp includes any derivative, concentrate, extract, resin, or other product made from a hemp plant.

*Smoking* means inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe or any other lighted or heated product containing, made or derived from nicotine, cannabis, hemp, or other plant, whether natural or synthetic, that is intended for inhalation. Smoking will also include using an electronic delivery device.

*Use* means smoking, inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted eigar, eigarette, pipe, weed, or plant in any manner of in any form, chewing, sniffing, and spitting.

#### Sec. 34-57 - Prohibited activities

- (a) Smoking is prohibited in all city parks, in all public parking lots that are adjacent to City Parks, and inside all motor vehicles located in any city park or adjacent to public parking lot. *Tobacco and cannabis use prohibited in certain areas*. Tobacco, cannabis. And cannabinoid product use is prohibited in the following areas:
  - (1) City parks;
  - (2) Inside motor vehicles owned or operated by the city;
  - (3) Inside motor vehicles at city parks.
- (b) Exceptions. Notwithstanding any other provision to the contrary, the following areas are exempt from the provisions of this article:
  - (1) City streets, easements, and sidewalks unless located adjacent or within city parks.

#### Sec. 34-58 - Posting of signs

#### Sec. 34-59 - Enforcement

- (a) *Complaints*. Any citizen who desires to register a complaint under this article may initiate enforcement with the city administrator or his/her designee.

It shall be a petty misdemeanor for any person to use discard tobacco, cannabis, hemp or any cannabinoid product in an area where tobacco use is prohibited by the provisions of this article a city park or parking lot adjacent to a city park, except in a designated trash receptacle.
- (c) Other applicable laws. This article shall not be interpreted or construed to permit tobacco, cannabis, hemp, or cannabinoid product use where it is otherwise restricted by other applicable laws.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 23-0X

#### CITY OF FALCON HEIGHTS RAMSEY COUNTY, MINNESOTA

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE FALCON HEIGHTS CITY CODE CONCERNING USE OF TOBACCO, AND-CANNABIS AND HEMP IN-FREE PARKS CITY PARKS

#### THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FALCON HEIGHTS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Article III of Chapter 34 of the Falcon Heights City Code is amended by adding Article III in its entirety to read as follows:

Article III – <u>USE OF</u> TOBACCO, <u>AND-CANNABIS</u>, <u>AND HEMP IN \_FREECITY</u> PARKS

34-55 PURPOSE. The City of Falcon Heights believes that there is sufficient medical evidence showing that the <a href="use-smoking">use-smoking</a> of tobacco, <a href="cannabis, eannabinoid productshemp">cannabis, eannabinoid productshemp</a> and second-hand smoke is a danger to the health, safety and general welfare of the community. Numerous studies have found that tobacco, <a href="and-cannabis">and-hemp</a> smoke is a cause for diseases and second-hand smoke is particularly hazardous for children and the elderly. Discarding of tobacco, <a href="cannabis">cannabis</a>, <a href="hemp">hemp</a>, and <a href="cannabinoid">cannabinoid</a> products on the ground can result in litter and pose a risk of harm by, among other things being ingested by young children. The purpose of this Ordinance is to set forth rules <a href="banning-concerning">banning-concerning</a> the use of tobacco, <a href="cannabis">cannabis</a>, <a href="hemp">hemp</a> and <a href="cannabinoid">cannabinoid</a> products in city parks, thereby making such areas cleaner, safer and more enjoyable for residents and the general public.

34-56 DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of this code section, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning:

City Parks means any open or enclosed land improvements or facility which is owned, leased and operated by the City of Falcon Heights and which is reserved, designated or used for a playground, picnic area, garden area, bike or walking path, trail, nature preserve, green space, tennis court, sports or athletic field, staking rink, warming house, or other recreational open space area, and includes city owned parking areas serving city parks or city facility and sidewalks located directly adjacent to a city park or facility.

*Tobacco* means cigarettes and any product containing, made, or derived from tobacco that is intended for human consumption, whether chewed, smoked, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, or any component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product; cigars; cheroots; stogies; perique; granulated, plug cut, crimp cut, ready rubbed, and other smoking tobacco; snuff; snuff flour; cavendish; plug and twist tobacco; fine cut and other chewing tobaccos; shorts; refuse scraps, clippings,

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cuttings and sweepings of tobacco; and other kinds and forms of tobacco. Tobacco excludes any tobacco product that has been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product, as a tobacco dependence product, or for other medical purposes, and is being marketed and sold solely for such an approved purpose.

<u>Cannabis</u> means any product containing, made, or derived from cannabis that is intended for human consumption, including but not limited to flowers, seeds, resins, extracts, oils, tinctures, and edible forms, whether consumed by smoking, vaporizing, eating, drinking, or any other means.

<u>Cannabinoid products</u> mean any products infused with any cannabinoids, including but not limited to tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and cannabidiol (CBD).

Electronic Delivery Devise means any product containing or delivering nicotine, lobelia or any other substance, whether natural or synthetic, intended for human consumption through the inhalation of aerosol or vapor from the product. Electronic delivery device includes, but is not limited to, devices manufactured, marketed or sold as e-cigarettes, e-cigars, e-pipes, vape pens, mods, tank systems, or under any other product name or descriptor.

Hemp means any product containing the harvested flower, bud, leaves, or stems of a plant of the genus Cannabis that has a delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of no more than 0.3 percent on a dry weight basis. Hemp includes any derivative, concentrate, extract, resin, or other product made from a hemp plant.

Smoking means inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe or any other lighted or heated product containing, made or derived from nicotine, cannabis, hemp, or other plant, whether natural or synthetic, that is intended for inhalation. Smoking will also include using an electronic delivery device.

Use means smoking, inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted cigar, cigarette, pipe, weed, or plant in any manner of in any form, chewing, sniffing, and spitting.

#### 34-57 PROHIBITED ACTIVITIES.

A.—Smoking is prohibited in all city parks, in all public parking lots that are adjacent to City Parks, and inside all motor vehicles located in any city park or adjacent public parking lot. Tobacco and cannabis use prohibited in certain areas.

Tobacco, cannabis, and cannabinoid product use is prohibited in the following areas:

(1) City Parks;

(2) Inside motor vehicles owned or operated by the City;

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- B. Exceptions. Notwithstanding any other provision to the contrary, the following areas are exempt from the provisions of this chapter:
  - (1) City streets, easements, and sidewalks unless located adjacent or within city parks.

#### 34-58 POSTING OF SIGNS

A. "No SmokingTobacco and Cannabis Free Grounds" sign or signs with a similar designation will be clearly and conspicuously displayed at City Parks to notify the public that smokingsmoking including and other tobacco, cannabis, hemp and cannabinoid productor other plant use is prohibited.

#### 34-59 ENFORCEMENT

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- A. *Complaints*. Any citizen who desires to register a complaint under this chapter may initiate enforcement with the City Administrator or his/her designee.
- B. Violation and Penalty. It shall be a petty misdemeanor for any person to use discard tobacco, cannabis, or anyhemp or any cannabinoid product inan area where tobacco such use is prohibited by the provisions of this chapter a city park or parking lot adjacent to a city park, except in a designated trash receptacle.
- C. Other applicable laws. This chapter shall not be interpreted or construed to permit tobacco, cannabis, <a href="here">hemp or cannabinoid product</a> use where it is otherwise restricted by other applicable laws.
