The new asphalt can be driven on I hour after it is rolled; however, we ask that you avoid sharply turning your wheels, especially while stopped, as it can leave permanent markings on the finished surface.

>>> CODE ENFORCEMENT CORNER



NATIVE PLANTS ADD BEAUTY, HELP POLLINATORS AND IMPROVE SOILS

Question: How can you add beauty to your outdoor space - with bright flowers, intriguing plant textures and busy, colorful pollinators - while also doing less work than you do for your lawn and helping out our local ecosystem?

Answer: Plant native plants! Once your plants get established, they will not need much watering, mulching or mowing, and will provide nectar for pollinators, habitat for other wildlife and deep roots that hold the soil, help control stormwater runoff, prevent erosion and provide habitat for wildlife.

There are easy ways to get started with native plants, or learn how to do a better job of nurturing the native plants you planted or just found in your yard. Check out:

- University of Minnesota Extension's Native Plants or Creating a butterfly garden
- Minnesota State Horticulture Society, especially:
 - o Building a Pollinator Garden Minnesota State Horticultural Society
 - How to be a Backyard Hero(Learn how to be a pollinators champion)
- Landscaping with native plants | Minnesota DNR
- Minnesota Wildflowers (great picture-based guide to native and non-native plants)
- Pollinator Conservation Resources: Great Lakes Region | Xerces Society

If you need financial or technical assistance for your native planting project, consider grants:

- Apply for Lawns to Legumes Assistance Blue Thumb or
- Clean Water Project Grants CRWD

Need inspiration? Head to Minneapolis Wirth Park, to the <u>Eloise Butler Wildflower Garden</u> and <u>Bird Sanctuary</u>, where you can have volunteers answer your questions about the abundant native plants and pollinators you will see there.

Community Park

- Upper Picnic Area (against building): 5 picnic tables, trash bins

Each picnic area is \$20 + tax for a half day or \$35 + tax for a full day.


