

2024 City Budget and Tax Levy Approved

The Falcon Heights City Council approved the 2024 city budget and property tax levy at its regular meeting on Wednesday, December 13.

The 2024 city budget totals \$3.5 million, which is an increase of 13.7% compared to the 2023 budget. The general city budget pays for services such public safety, public woks, parks and general government operations.

The primary contributing factor to the increased budget is the proposed increase in the law enforcement services contract with the Ramsey County Sheriff's Office to provide interim coverage in 2024. Additionally, the budget includes a \$4 million capital program that is the largest in City history, which primarily includes \$3.5 million for the renovation of Community Park. Other capital projects included for 2024 is resurfacing Roselawn east of Snelling in partnership with the City of Roseville, replacement of the streetlights on Larpenteur Avenue, and re-painting the city monument signs.

The 2024 property tax levy is \$2.7 million, which is an increase of 9.12%. The impact of this property tax levy on a median valued home, which in 2024 is assessed at \$373,950 (3.3% increase over 2023), is estimated to result in an increase of \$117 annualy in the City portion of the homeowner's taxes. The City's levy increase of 9.12% is around the average 2024 levy increase for the metro region.

The City's 2024 budget is not entirely funded through commercial and residential property taxes. It is also funded through fees for service, state, and federal aid.

New Senior Maintenance Worker

Public Works has a new employee!

Street Sweeping

Public Works will be performing repairs to the street sweeper. They will be repairing the air rams that activate the side brooms on the sweeper.

Curtiss Field Hockey Rink

Public Works will be removing all leaves and sticks from within the Curtiss Field hockey rink. This will help ready the rink for when weather remains cold enough to flood the rinks. The IO-day forecast suggests weather will be too warm for ice rink flooding until after the new year.

Curtiss Field

Public Works will re-seal two manholes that provide access to the underground storm water storage tanks at Curtiss Fleld. Both are located within the hockey rink and resealing will help prevent water from flowing into the manholes while the hockey rink is established.

Repairs

Public Works will be making repairs to the fleet as needed.








COMMUNITY PARK TIMELINE



Ramsey County Prepares For Climate Change With New Action Framework

The effects of climate change impact everyone in Ramsey County. So, the county is taking steps to address that and create opportunities to strengthen the economy, improve health and create a more equitable community for everyone.

Ramsey County recently published its first Climate Action Framework to guide the county's response to climate change. The framework was developed with input from residents, county staff and key partners. It builds on the six focus areas identified in the State of Minnesota Climate Action Framework:

- Clean transportation: Connect people to places through a safe, equitable and sustainable transportation system.
- Climate-smart natural land: Manage county land to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, support healthy ecosystems and increase environmental resilience.
- Thriving communities: Collaboratively build the capacity of Ramsey County communities to survive and thrive in changing conditions.
- Clean energy and efficient buildings: Pursue 100% carbon-free, reliable and affordable electrical power and heat sources through policies, investments and partnerships.
- Healthy lives: Partner with community to reduce the direct and indirect health impacts of climate change together.
- Clean economy: Build an economy that addresses climate change and creates equitable opportunities for all.

County departments will focus on "near-term" actions outlined in the plan over the course of 2024. They will share updates on this work at ramseycounty.us/ClimateAction.

A team of residents will meet with county staff regularly throughout the year to review progress and discuss ways to improve outcomes. While the current team has been selected, there will be opportunities for new residents to participate later in the year.

Getting The Lead Out

In 2023 SPRWS launched an ambitious IO-year plan to remove all lead service lines in both private and public property. Lead Free SPRWS is offering free replacement to customers.

SPRWS is actively planning the next ten years of the program by working on obtaining funding and choosing an appropriate number of replacements to complete each year based on the funding. The SPRWS service area will be divided into project zones and they will prioritize based on several factors. Information will be shared on SPRWS website as soon as it is available. Reduce Lead in Drinking Water

There are steps you can take to reduce exposure if you have a lead service line or lead in your interior plumbing:

- Let the water run for 3-5 minutes before using it for drinking or cooking if the water has collected in your plumbing for more than 6 hours.
- Use cold water for drinking, cooking, and preparing baby formula. Hot water absorbs more lead from pipes than cold water.
- At least once a quarter, remove your aerator from your faucet and rinse the filter out.
- Use a water pitcher or point of use filter for your drinking water/

Check in is 10-10:30 AM at RAHS lower gym lobby. 1240 County Road B2 W, Roseville, MN 55113


The clinic will be held from 10:30 AM to 12:30 PM.

O Christmas Tree, O Christmas Tree, What Are Thy Greenest Choices?

If you set up a Christmas tree in your home, perhaps you've thought about the environmental implications. Your purchasing decision (real or artificial) and your method of disposal (landfill, incineration, or composting) have pros and cons regarding climate change, pollution, and biodiversity.

When you purchase a real tree, you support a farmer who is keeping their land green. The trees on their farm (which grow for about a dozen years before harvesting) clean the air, store carbon, and provide habitat for a variety of species. Production of real trees doesn't result in as much carbon emission as the production and shipping of artificial trees from China. However, it is worth noting that an artificial tree that is reused for a decade or more has its advantages: no matter how someone disposes of a natural tree there are downsides (landfills pollute, while incineration or composting release carbon into the atmosphere). Perhaps the greenest choice is to decorate a live, container-grown tree.

When it's time to give a real tree the old heave-ho, it's probably best to follow <u>Ramsey County's advice</u>: remove decorations and bring it to a yard waste collection site. From there, as long as it's not full of fake snow or tinsel, your tree will be turned into mulch. Disposal is free of charge and sites are located in St. Paul Midway as well as Arden Hills. From now until March, sites are open Saturday 9 am – 5 pm and Sunday II am to 5 pm. Don't wait too long: if you leave a decaying tree in your backyard all winter, you risk spreading <u>invasive pests</u>. It's also legal to place holiday trees in the trash, but be aware that haulers might charge extra for this.
