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Message From Mayor Gustafson

Our small city, nestled within a larger metropolitan area, is committed to meeting the challenges of providing services that ensure our community remains a vibrant place to live, work, play, and raise families. Considerations for service delivery include methods, reasons, costs, and effectiveness. Public safety is a paramount concern for our city, encompassing police, fire, emergency medical services, streets, crosswalks, sidewalks, and neighbor disputes, among others.

Our first responders do their jobs so well that their services and the systems that support them are often taken for granted. Falcon Heights, Lauderdale, and St. Anthony Village shared a 23-year police service relationship from the mid-1990s until the late-2010s.

On July 6, 2016, any complacency surrounding policing was jolted out of our communities when Philando Castile was killed on Larpenteur Avenue.

Out of those dark and painful times our communities responded, seeking solutions to address underlying problems and build a better future.

In response, Falcon Heights, as a purchaser of contract police services, initiated a process to redefine our community values regarding inclusion and policing. Over five months, with purpose-driven community conversations and the work of a professionally-facilitated citizen task force, we took the first steps to define values and expectations. Our Cultivating a Caring Community efforts continue today, aiming to foster inclusion, awareness, and cultural competency, and recognizing that every community member has value.

Following Philando Castile's death, the longstanding contract between Falcon Heights and St. Anthony Village ended in December 2017.

Since January 2018, Falcon Heights has contracted with Ramsey County Sheriff's Office. The contract, while not tailored for Falcon Heights, does provide services that meet some of our identified community values. Sheriff Fletcher, who took office in 2019, suggested in his sole appearance at a Falcon Heights Council meeting in September 2020 that Falcon Heights should seek a new policing partner. Since then, your Council has been working to find a new provider. This journey, shadowed by the events of 2016, has been challenging.

In 2022, the city engaged the Center for Values-Based Initiatives to review our service call history and gather resident feedback, aiding us in clarifying our needs and expectations from future service providers. The resulting 125-page report, available on our website, portrays Falcon Heights as a safe and quiet community with minimal emergency calls, highlighting a demand for medical assistance, addressing false alarms, and assisting citizens as our primary needs.

Community forums and surveys revealed a desire for policing that delivers on the values of Honesty, Leadership, Respect, and Service, with many residents expressing how they missed the community-based services once provided by the officers of St. Anthony.

In 2017, the St. Anthony Police Department (SAPD) courageously sought assistance from the Department of Justice through their Collaborative Reform for Technical Assistance Team. With the support of their City Council and residents, the SAPD has embraced growth and reforms to meet community expectations, including a new strategic plan, a new policy manual, body cameras, officer wellness, and community focus. The transparency with robust reports available on the SAV website include use of force, traffic stop data, calls for service, and more.

As I reflect on the strides made by St. Anthony Village and its police department since 2017, I see a potential partner that truly shares our values.

In the coming weeks ahead the City Councils and communities of Falcon Heights, Lauderdale and St. Anthony Village will be exploring a potential partnership to help SAPD officers deliver community focused safety services with all three of our communities working together.

My hope is that you, and all residents, will participate in this journey.

Research and review the information in this newsletter and other sources. Share your thoughts via the survey, and other outreach efforts. Public safety is a community effort that needs each of us to succeed.

Potential Police Partnership with City of St. Anthony Village

The City of Falcon Heights has been looking for a long-term fit for policing services with our current contract expiring in December 2024.

The Ramsey County Sheriff's Office (RCSO) has provided policing since January 1, 2018. The City and the RCSO mutually agreed that Falcon Heights should explore law enforcement options that are a better long-term fit, primarily for logistical reasons.

Falcon Heights partnered with the Center for Values-Based Initiatives in 2022 and 2023 to analyze our existing police services contract and resident satisfaction with law enforcement within the city. The process included community engagement to gather feedback on priorities and needs, building upon earlier engagement conducted by the Inclusion and Policing Task Force in 2016 and 2017.

City leadership have carefully analyzed the city's needs and available policing options over the past several months. Based on this review, creating a renewed partnership with St. Anthony Village has emerged as a potential good fit for several reasons: level of service, physical proximity, logistics, financial considerations, and – most importantly – the clear commitment the St. Anthony Village Police Department (SAPD) demonstrates to practices that align with the values of Falcon Heights residents.

Through the focus groups and randomized resident survey conducted by the Center for Values-Based Initiatives, many of our residents expressed that they miss the level of services previously provided by the SAPD and appreciated the department's community-based policing approach.

Understandably, the thought of a partnership will raise concerns and painful memories of the killing of Philando Castile in our city. As we discuss a potential relationship, it's imperative that we recognize Philando and the impact his killing had on all of us — including his loved ones, the communities of Falcon Heights and St. Anthony Village, our leaders and our staff, along with the members of the St. Anthony Police Department and their families.

The Falcon Heights City Council and St. Anthony Village City Council met in a joint workshop February 8th for an initial discussion about a potential police services partnership.

No formal action was taken during the workshop. Council members from both cities expressed initial interest in beginning a multi-phase process to determine if a renewed partnership makes sense for each community, as well as the City of Lauderdale, which contracts with St. Anthony Village for police services.

Council members agreed that the first phase should focus on community engagement, expressing the importance of gathering and listening to feedback, questions and concerns from residents, City staff, St. Anthony Police Department (SAPD) officers and other stakeholders.

Potential Police Partnership: FAQ

What is Falcon Heights looking for in a police services partner?

- The City wants a partnership that makes sense logistically, is financially feasible and, most importantly, reflects the policing approach and priorities community members have identified.
- The City expects that respect for all will be the foundation for policing in Falcon Heights with the following priorities: emergency response, cultural competence and community engagement, informative policing, and prioritization of serious moving violations.
- Additionally, the partner should place an emphasis on building positive police-community relationships, recognizing that mutual safety is built through mutual trust. A partner should also conduct extensive training that focuses on de-escalation, cultural competency, and explicit and implicit bias, along with mental health care and community relationship building.
- The selected partner will also be asked to provide data reporting and transparency through ongoing data analysis, public feedback and open communication.

What changes has the department made since Philando Castile was killed?

- The St. Anthony Police Department has evolved since the termination of the previous agreement, completing extensive work with the United States Department of Justice's Collaborative Reform for Technical Assistance team in 2016 through 2018.
- From this process, the department developed an overall strategic plan following input from the community. This plan is a guiding document that defines every action that the department takes as individual officers and as an agency, including implementing significant policy changes and body-worn cameras along with an internal auditing process to ensure officer compliance and accountability.
- The department also conducts an annual use-of-force analysis and traffic-stop data, and shares the reports publicly on the City's website: www.savmn.com/494/Accountable-and-Transparent

What does 21st century policing philosophy mean?

- St. Anthony Village has committed to community-oriented policing which focuses on building relationships with residents and ensuring officer wellbeing while reducing crime.
- In 2019, the police department completed a comprehensive review of its policy manual and confirmed that current department policy and training is consistent with the 8 Can't Wait practices, which studies show can lead to 72% fewer police killings. Most practices had been covered in SAPD policy for several years. They include:
 - Banning chokeholds and strangleholds (SAPD Policy #300.5.6)
 - Requiring de-escalation (SAPD Policy #300.3)
 - Requiring a warning before shooting (SAPD Policy #300.5.4)
 - Exhausting all means before shooting (SAPD Policy #300.5)
 - Requiring a duty to intervene (SAPD Policy #300.2.1)
 - Banning shooting at moving vehicles (SAPD Policy #300.7.2)
 - Requiring a use-of-force continuum (SAPD Policy #300.5.3)
 - Requiring comprehensive reporting (SAPD Policy #300.9)
- The department interacts with thousands of residents, businesses, visitors and other stakeholders each year.

Potential Police Partnership: FAQs Cont.

What training programs do St. Anthony police officers complete?

- All officers are trained in accordance with Minnesota Board of Peace Officer Standards and Training (MN POST) and City of St. Anthony Village requirements including conflict management, mental health, implicit bias, crime scene management, leadership and community engagement, among other topics.
- The SAPD operates a robust ongoing training program including annual trainings on de-escalation, use of force and crisis intervention.
- In 2023, the department completed more than 1,600 training hours.

What will accountability look like?

- Transparency and accountability are ingrained in the culture of the St. Anthony Police Department (SAPD). The department's Strategic Plan highlights the commitment to accountability and a continual evaluation of the accountability processes. The SAPD has an updated complaint and commendation reporting process, which is available online and is reflected in policy. All officers are trained on the policy. All concerns are thoroughly investigated, recorded in the Records Management System, and all formal complaints are additionally recorded with the Minnesota Board of Peace Officer Standards and Training (MN POST Board), along with the final outcome of the investigation.
- All SAPD officers wear a Body Worn Camera (BWC), which records nearly all encounters with the public. These cameras work seamlessly with squad mounted cameras and all SAPD facility cameras. In addition, the SAPD developed an internal compliance system to ensure:
 - All officers are using the BWC according to policy
 - Officers' actions are professional and according to policy
 - All equipment is working properly.
 - In 2023, officers were 99% compliant. The quality of SAPD's internal compliance program has been recognized nationally with invitations to present best practices at the Center for Naval Analysis and the Department of Justice's National Body Worn Camera Conference.
- The department reports annually on all use-of-force incidents and on all traffic stops.

When would the cities vote on a contract?

- The councils could vote on a contract in the coming months if both are interested in moving forward. A specific timeline is to be determined.

When would the partnership start?

- The earliest start date would be January 1, 2025.

What are the next steps in the process?

- Both cities are committed to an extensive community engagement process. Page 7 outlines the engagement plan for Falcon Heights to ensure all voices have a chance to be heard and listened to.

2024 City Projects

2024 Pavement Management Plan (PMP)

The City of Falcon Heights manages a comprehensive Pavement Management Program, which includes repaving local streets. One of the streets identified for rehabilitation is Roselawn Avenue from Snelling Avenue to Hamline Avenue. This street is at the border of Falcon Heights and Roseville, and has been anticipated for rehabilitation by both cities in their Capital Improvement Plans. Falcon Heights and Roseville will be jointly constructing a pavement mill and overlay on Roselawn Avenue to include minor utility work, and spot curb and gutter repairs.

Project Schedule:

The schedule is shown below. Items that require City Council action are marked “CC”:

- **March 2024:** Bid Opening; CC Award Contract.
- **Spring 2024:** Preconstruction Neighborhood Meeting.
- **Summer 2024:** Construction Start.
- **Fall 2024:** Substantial Completion and CC Assessment Hearing.

Larpenteur Avenue Streetlight Project

The City of Falcon Heights owns and maintains 34 decorative street lights that were installed in the 1990s between Arona Street and Fry Street. Due to underground wire faults and motor vehicle accidents, many of the streetlights no longer function and need full replacement. The proposed lights are decorative LED and will have a single light head and arms for decorative banners. The new lights will have access panels at minimum of 10’ from the ground, which will make copper wire theft much more difficult. To create a similar design aesthetic in the area, the lights will be similar to the St. Paul lights on Cleveland Avenue and Como Avenue, but the post colors will be Falcon Heights dark green and the lanterns will be glass-free. The lights are DarkSky International approved, and will help significantly improve lighting in the corridor without unnecessary light pollution.

Project Schedule:

- December 2023: City Council awarded the contract to Forest Lake Contracting, Inc.
- Spring 2024: Construction Start.
- Summer 2024: Project completion is expected prior to the start of the State Fair.

City Monument Signs / Gazebo Painting

All city-owned monuments signs on Larpenteur Avenue and Snelling Avenue will also receive a refresh. The monuments will be repainted in Falcon Heights dark green, they will receive rust removal and the glass will be refinished. Lastly, the gazebo at Curtiss Field park will be sandblasted and repainted.

Community Park Renovation

Overview

The City officially closed on the purchase of Community Park back in May of 2023. The City has leased the 15.5-acre Community Park property from the University of Minnesota Twin Cities since the early 1970s. With the purchase completed and the long-term ownership secured for the property, the City will undergo our long-anticipated renovation of the park, which will include new amenities and a brand-new park building.

The City hired WSB as the project manager and HCM Architects for the renovation. Both firms have extensive experience with major park renovation projects. For the past couple of months WSB, HCM Architects, City Staff and the Parks and Recreation Commission have been working towards finalizing a park layout and design for a new building.

Public Process

The City hired WSB in 2014 to undertake a Parks Master Plan. The City did not proceed with the park renovation at that time, primarily due to lack of funding and uncertainty over the future leasing agreements with the U of M. Since that time, the City has asked residents for their opinions on the renovation at various City events. WSB and HCM Architects took previous feedback and designs and used them as their starting point in fall of 2023. They presented initial designs at a Public Engagement session on November 6, 2023, where residents provided feedback. The City then created an online survey that residents were encouraged to take between November 20 and December 26, 2023. WSB and HCM Architects took this data into consideration when making revisions to the park layout and building. The Parks and Recreation Commission and City Council held a joint workshop meeting on January 3, 2024 to discuss the latest renderings and make semi-final recommendations. The semi-final plans were presented during a Public Hearing on February 14, 2024, where the public either shared comments in-person or through written submissions. At the end of the Public Hearing, the Falcon Heights City Council voted in favor of accepting designs as final from WSB and HCM Architects. WSB and HCM Architects will now spend the next few months further developing the designs in preparation for bidding.

Project Schedule:

The schedule is shown below. Items that require Council action are marked “CC”:

November 2023—February 2024– Public Engagement.

March 2024– June 2024– Final designs, bidding, award of project.

Late Summer 2025 – Demolition of current building.

Fall/Winter – Construction of Phase I.

Spring 2025—Opening of new park building.

Spring 2025—Award of plans for Phase II (if applicable).

75th Anniversary

On April 1, 1949, by a vote of 5 to 1, the citizens rejected petitioning either Roseville or St. Paul for annexation, and chose instead to establish their own independent village government. The incorporation of the Village of Falcon Heights brought in all of the remaining unincorporated areas of Rose Township, including the State Fairgrounds, University of Minnesota Campus Golf Course, and Test Fields. In 1973, the Village of Falcon Heights became a city.
